## 1996 THETA CHAPTER "FALLFEST REUNION"

We had a great reunion of brothers and guests at OWU at the October 18-20, 1996, all-class reunion. It was terrific to get together with alumni from many different classes plus the current chapter of 22 fine young men. It was great, and the 35 alumni who were able to return enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Actually, the dinner totaled over 70, including guests, parents and undergraduates.

It is difficult to plan a function like this due to people's calendars, distances from Delaware, costs, etc. But it seems logical to think you would enjoy seeing brothers (friends) whom you probably would not see if this type of opportunity were not available. We are eager to plan toward the year 2003 when Theta Chapter is 150 years old. We pledge to you better long-range date and activity planning for all future attempts at such a function. We hope to see many more of you on that occasion!

One last thought for all of you. This chapter is in good hands and still building and growing. To operate financially, they need 35-40 men. We have a great group of young men. They need alumni support in body and money. The Greek system encompasses about 45 percent of the male students, but the university funnels only the room and board funds to the House Corporation to fund the food and operation of the

chapter. The yearly request for financial support to continue the alumni activities of the House Corporation — which includes communications with alumni through our newsletters and other mailings — is the solicitation made through the Theta Data. During the 1995-96 giving year, 118 alumni contributed a total of \$5,330 to our program. Those are indeed generous and appreciated contributions. And yet there is always room for improvement. The total number of those contributing is only 15 percent of our

#### ALL CLASS REUNION A SUCCESS

During the weekend of October 18-20, 1996, over 35 alumni with 15 spouses and guests, 22 undergraduates, parents and special guests attended special events on campus and at the Beta house. The weekend was highlighted by the OWU homecoming football game (although the weather and Wittenberg football team didn't cooperate) and a reception and dinner at Welch Hall. Saturday evening's dinner was attended by 75 alumni, undergraduates, parents and guests and featured Chairman Dick DeVos '54 introducing several speakers: President (and Beta brother) Tom Courtice, District Chief Dave Wright, House Corporation President Bill Rowland '68 and Chapter President Mike Dowgiewicz '98. Speaker comments included updates on University life and the role of Greeks on campus, as well as updates on chapter affairs from the perspective of the National, the House Corporation and the undergraduates. With over 700 freshmen, the outlook for both the University and Greek rushing opportunities is very positive. Our undergraduates have a strong organization with high academic achievements (almost at an overall 3.0 average).

Closing the weekend was a special Sunday morning service led by the Rev. W. Dan Rich '55. Printed at right is "The Bridge Builder" which was used by Brother Rich as a part of his short service, with special emphasis on recognizing those who preceded us and their important legacy to those of us who followed — of particular meaning to those of us who experienced such legacies in our undergraduate experiences.

## ANNUAL THETA CHAPTER DUES

In each issue of the *Theta Data*, we provide a form that allows our alumni the opportunity to update their names, addresses, phone numbers, e-mail addresses and other newsworthy information about themselves. You can also recount your memories of what Beta has meant to you. This is very important for the Alumni Records Office of the chapter in maintaining current, accurate records. We appreciate your cooperation in periodically sharing this information with us; your updates allow our continued communication with you.

Of equal importance is the opportunity for us to support through our dues the publication, printing and mailing of the *Theta Data* and other mail communications that are required each year. Alumni annual dues support is about equal to the expense of our alumni communications.

You will note that this year, our form for the first time allows you the opportunity for your contributions to be made by charging to a credit card; i.e. Master Card, Visa, etc. We are doing this for your convenience and in an effort to provide an opportunity for more contributors to participate. Periodically, we will report to you our progress in both (1) the number of contributors and (2) the amount of support received. For your information, we have included below a table of recent giving results.

During this same period, the annual expense for publication, printing and mailing the *Theta Data* and other alumni communications has been a low of \$3,440 and a high in 1995-96 of \$5,580.

In addition to keeping you informed about the dues support program, we will be providing you with more information as to the contract between the House Corporation and OWU. It is through this contract that Theta chapter is allowed to reside in the fraternity house, which is owned by the University. In return for the use of the facility, the House Corporation has certain duties and obligations as to the operations of the chapter, its budget and the physical maintenance and upkeep of the property. Some of the responsibilities are the University's and some are the House Corporation's. But more about this subject later, along with more information about "how we are doing."

## THETA: A CHAPTER WORTHY OF YOUR SUPPORT

This speech was delivered by Chapter President Michael Dowgiewicz '98 on Alumni Weekend. We thought those of you who weren't able to be there would appreciate the opportunity to see it.

It means a lot to see so many back here. I think that even with 143 years of history, when you lose years like we did in the '80s, it can easily create a situation where the undergraduates can feel forgotten. That obviously is not the case here and I'd like to take the opportunity to thank all of you — but especially Dick DeVos and Tom Tatham — for putting this together.

Reunions like the ones we've had in past years go a long way in terms of renewing the enthusiasm of everyone in both Beta's history and future. I don't believe the future for Beta here at Ohio Wesleyan has looked brighter in a long time. The house is led by a highly motivated class of juniors that assumed operations as only sophomores and moved forward with the rare opportunity to balance the enthusiasm of underclassmen with the experience that comes with time. We have the chance to be leaders for two years instead of just one, and I think that that can spell nothing but positives for the Theta chapter. In fact, right now it seems difficult to find an aspect of the house operations that has not improved immensely in the past year.

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## 1996 FOUNDERS FUND SCHOLARS

Annually, hundreds of Beta undergraduates apply for Founders Fund scholarships, funded by alumni gifts to the Beta Leadership Fund. In all, the Foundation awarded scholarships, much of it for graduate study, to 72 deserving young men. We are proud to announce that two 1996 recipients are from Theta Chapter. To begin with, I hope that everyone has had a moment or two to see the physical improvements to the house. The interior and exterior have both been painted since this summer, and last winter we added a television room in the basement. With the combined efforts of undergraduate brothers and our House Corporation, we have improved the day-to-day care and maintenance of the house to the point of winning accolades for house management even from the University, normally a pretty tough grader when it comes to fraternity houses.

Last year we made a conscious effort to recruit the young men whom we could be sure not to lose to academic problems, as has been the case too often in the past. The results were the highest pledge class GPAs in the fall and spring and an overall house GPA of 2.96, third among 12 and climbing.

As proud as we are of our scholastics, I take special pride in the way that the enthusiasm in the house has spilled onto the athletic field. Aside from our many varsity athletes, support for the intramural program has tripled since I was a freshman and again the results are obvious: winning seasons in every sport last year and a 14-2 record in football, soccer, and volleyball this fall so far. I consider intramurals to be a great indicator for house strength in terms of morale and brotherhood within the house, and as I look around the Hill these days, it's the same houses that struggle in those areas that are forfeiting games or losing to us by four touchdowns.

None of this means much though — I'm constantly reminded by Dick and Tom and other alums - without that ever-important large pledge class that, with so much going for us, we seem destined for. Our rush chair Ramsy Mahjoub '98, the "rush machine" we call him for his tireless efforts, has done a job this first month-and-a-half that has me extremely confident in rush. More importantly, however, I see that the burden of responsibility has not fallen completely on his shoulders and instead, the quiet and unsure sophomores of last year have become confident salesmen for what they know is the best product OWU has to offer — Beta brotherhood. As for this year's sophomores, they never seemed unsure of themselves and have helped more than I think anyone expected of them. Even the stereotypically apathetic seniors are excited about rush, typified by fifth-year student Pindar VanArman '96, who won't even be here in the spring, but nevertheless works as hard as anyone to ensure us a pledge class that has the chance to

define this house. Graduating just three seniors next spring means that we can nearly double the size of the house with a class of the quality and quantity that I anticipate.

Rush is not a simple thing these days though, and at times, four months of rushing — which was confined to a week or two when most of you went through it — can be enormously taxing both physically and financially. That is why events like this are so important to recharge the chapter in its efforts, and why alumni like Dick DeVos '54, Tom Tatham '56 and Bill Rowland '68, who help raise and manage our funds, are appreciated.

As I said before, there is still room for improvement in academics, and the size of the house in recent years has limited our philanthropy efforts; however, I consider these areas to hopefully someday simply complement what in my estimation — and hopefully yours after this weekend — is a chapter worthy of carrying the Beta name and the Theta Legacy that you have created for us.

## BENWARE '90 INDUCTED INTO OWU ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

On Saturday, October 19, 1996, at the Ohio Wesleyan University Athletic Hall of Fame ceremonies, Todd R. Benware '90 was inducted into the Hall of Fame for his significant achievements in the sport of golf.

A two-time All-America golfer and NCAC Player of the Year, Todd was the first player to win the NCAC tournament twice. He made an immediate impact on the Bishop golf program, firing a 147 to win the OWU/Strimer tournament in his college debut. He went on to win NCAC Player of the Year honors as a sophomore, winning the individual title in a playoff after finishing with 225. He then fired a 232 at the NCAA Division III tournament to tie for 20th and take honorable mention All-America laurels in helping the Bishops to a fourth-place NCAA finish. He repeated as NCAC Player of the Year as a junior, again winning in a playoff, after shooting a 154. He carded a 311 at NCAA Division III for a 23rd-place tie and his second straight honorable mention All-America citation as the team finished third in the national tournament. He fired 151 as part of a school-record 580 (for 36-hole, 4- and 5-man total) at the Marietta Invitational. He won the Muskingum and Denison-Capital titles as a senior and was second-team all-league, then shot a 312 at the NCAA Division III tournament as the Bishops carded a school record 1202 in posting their best ever national finish with a second-place tie.

After working as a golf professional in the Graham, N.C., area over the last five years, Todd is currently working on obtaining his PGA tour card. Congratulations to Todd, and good luck as you tackle the next challenge in your golfing profession. You have brought honor to your school and fraternity for your skill in sport and your personal high standards of excellence. Your brothers take great pride in your achievements and well-deserved recognition.

Later in the evening, we heard from Dick DeVos '54, Bill Rowland '68, District Chief Dave Wright and current Theta President Michael Dowgiewicz '98. The main theme of the night: Theta chapter is on the verge of bigger and better things! A nucleus of young men is pushing us to the next level, a level that should see us win the prestigious Sisson Award.

## THETA'S ROBERT C. LAFFERTY '28 BEQUEATHS ESTATE TO BETA THETA PI

[Thank you to *The Beta Theta Pi Magazine* for allowing us to condense information for this article from the Convention 1996 issue.)

"When I hit college in 1924, I had \$8 in my pocket and few prospects for much more." The 93-year-old paused and added: "I couldn't think of anything better to do with what I've earned in my lifetime than to put it where it would do some real good helping some of our young men through school."

Robert C. Lafferty Jr., Ohio Wesleyan '28, willed his entire estate to the Beta Theta Pi Foundation for scholarships. In so doing, he joins 46

other Betas and friends who are members of The John Holt Duncan Society, designated for those who leave a legacy for the future of Beta Theta Pi and its active members through a specific bequest or gift.

In addition, Lafferty presented his unique collection of Zuni Indian jewelry - 45 bolas, necklaces and earrings of silver, turquoise and other semi-precious settings - to the Fraternity which will be permanently displayed at the Foundation and Administrative Office. ...

"I encourage all Betas to think long and hard. See where your money is going to do the most good after you're gone," Lafferty added. "Anything we can do to help the human race is worthwhile, even if it's a little bit."

Recalling his days at Theta chapter, Ohio Wesleyan, he said: "The Betas pledged this country bumpkin. It was the first time I was away from home. I was a lineman on the frosh football team — a mud-guard," he quipped.

"I was the house manager and kitchen steward for three years. Later on I was the first student to have a car. It was a 1913 Model T. Cost me \$18, which I borrowed from one of my professors. As a geology student, I needed to drive into the countryside on geological trips."

Noting that he wasn't sure which influenced him more, his college sheepskin or his Beta shingle, he added: "Both were instrumental in my life. At the Beta house, I learned how to study, how to handle a fork, how to dance, how to be a man. Now I just want to give a little back."

A veteran of World War II service in the Navy, he has had extensive professional experience in drilling and geological surveys throughout the U.S.
