The Early Years



Brad was born July 10, 1976 in Ashland, KY. His family lived in Franklin Furnace, OH (near Portsmouth), and the nearest hospital was across the river in KY. Periodic family relocations

Brad Chelton'98 coincided with his father's career as a Lutheran minister, from Franklin Furnace, OH to Sidney, OH to Charlottesville, VA to Columbus, OH, which Brad called home since 1988. Along the way his younger siblings, Jessica and Andrew, were born. His mother was a teacher for many of these years, taking time off on occasion to raise her children (she recently retired in June 2011).

Childhood fun included sports, especially baseball. The Chelton's backyard in Sidney, OH was the neighborhood baseball field, and there were large dirt patches in his yard for all of the bases and pitcher's mound, which drove his mother crazy. He had a very rewarding high school experience at St. Charles Preparatory School in Columbus. After graduation in 1994 he headed 20 miles north to begin his college years at Ohio Wesleyan.

<u>Obio Wesleyan</u>

Brad's decision to come to OWU was based on a few things; including OWU's good academic reputation, "small school" fit, and an opportunity to play collegiate baseball

His father grew up in Baltimore, MD, so all of Brad's life he made family trips there to visit family and friends. As Brad said, "it was pretty cool that my freshman year my roommate was Mike Dowgiewicz '98, who also grew up in Baltimore. Our first night at OWU included a Donato's pizza and a 12-pack of Budweiser."

Freshman year curriculum was indicative of a liberal arts school and he took classes in

<u>The Early Years</u>



Ted's early years were in London, Ohio. He was born in 1931 to Robert and Georgianna Chaney. His father, an OWU Beta in the 1920's (Roll #512), owned an insurance firm and

his mother, in addition to raising 3 children, was a teacher. She graduated from OWU in 1928. A grandfather also attended OWU and an uncle was also a Beta brother at Ohio State U. His sibling, Barbara still lives in Madison County, Ohio and a brother, Tom is in Denver, Colorado.

Growing up, Ted was encouraged in music and, because his grandmother had a flute, that was Ted's instrument of choice and his ticket to play in the London HS band. Although a bit shy, Ted was soon to come alive from the OWU and Beta environment he was soon to enjoy.

<u>Obio Wesleyan</u>

With several family connections with OWU, there was never any doubt as to what college would get Ted's application. In 1949 Ted was off to OWU and his first two years of rooming with his London friend, Ed Lilly '53. Ted was an accounting major from the very beginning. George Crowl (Geology professor) taught one of Ted's non-accounting classes and Ted became very interested in the subject. Although encouraged by Professor Crowl to make it his major, Ted stayed with the accounting department for his Wesleyan major. Ted's social life at OWU was limited, but for good reason..... more on that later.

<u>Beta Theta Pi</u>

Virtually upon his arrival on campus, after few visits to the fraternity open houses and with his family history, Ted was quickly pledged Beta at the 54 W. Lincoln house. Key in this was

astronomy, philosophy and geology. His most interesting class was a sports psychology class which included an analysis of quarterback performance in the Super Bowl which "might have been my only A my freshman year", reported Brad. His sophomore year saw him taking his first accounting class and decided that should be his major. Having focused curriculum for his last 3 years of college, Brad's grades improved and he graduated in 1998 with an accounting major and management minor. He told Aldo Adachi '99 many times while recruiting him to pledge Beta, that he could tell his parents Brad was proof that grades can improve when living in a fraternity house!

As an accounting major, nearly all of his classes were taught by either Professor Cliff Cook or JoAnn Harvey. Brad noted that they were both very helpful in his academic achievements as well as in his post-college successes.

Brad noted that "it was fun playing baseball with some of my Beta brothers (Dowgiewicz, Ramsy Mahjoub '98, Matt Jakubowski '99 and Wes Hall '99, Scott Yanney), including a Spring Break trip to Fort Myers, FL my freshman year. However, I decided to retire after our fall semester of our sophomore year, and this decision helped my academics...and my social calendar."

<u>Pledging Beta</u>

After arriving on campus his freshman year, it didn't take long for a first Beta interaction. Paul Corto '97 was Rush Chairman and went to high school with Mike Dowgiewicz, Brad's freshman year roommate. Brad noted, "Paul was instrumental in recruiting our pledge class and made sure we were at the Beta house frequently for meals, parties, etc. For our Thomson Hall crew (Ramsy Mahjoub '98, Dowgiewicz and me), the Beta house was literally steps away which made recruitment of us that much easier."

Brad has great memories of his time as a Beta, and won't be able to do them all justice in this article. "Looking back, one of

my favorite things about our house was the diversity of interests in the house - the sports fanatics, the "Deads Heads", and the philosophers to name a few (sometimes those interests were divided 2nd Floor vs.

3rd Floor)."

Brad notes, "I tried to be an active member of Theta Chapter in my years at OWU. I think I may have had the title as Co-Rush Chairman my sophomore year, but make no mistake, Ramsy Mahjoub led that charge and was very good at it. I was proud to serve as Vice President of the house during one of Dowgiewicz's years as president, and I also served as Alumni Chairman, working with alumni such as Tom Tatham on publishing the *Theta Data*. As for the memories..."

- Rush Week they were all good, but none topped sophomore year
- Intramurals, especially football and softball. One of my favorite memories was our scripted first play of every football game, an 8-yard out by me, QB Dowgiewicz hitting me on the numbers...it was unstoppable (and my only contribution to our football team)



Graduation and US Air Force

At the time of his graduation from OWU, Ted was also commissioned from the ROTC into the USAF. He was soon off to his first USAF assignment at, of all places, Wright Patterson Air Force base outside Dayton, Ohio..... only a short distance from his London home. His poor eyesight kept him from a flying assignment (as was true for many others) and as a result his active duty commitment was for only 2 years. His assignment and training prepared him for security and intelligence assignments, which included security background checks and a small amount of criminal investigation. He was promoted to chief of his section, which was at the displeasure of others of greater service and experience. Wright Patterson was a "dream assignment" for a non-military type and was perfect for Ted and Marianna's life style.

<u>Career</u>

Following his discharge from the Air Force in 1956, his civilian career began with a job in Lancaster, Ohio with Anchor Hocking.....thanks to a contact with Dick McClintock's father. After 1 year, Ted left for another opportunity with Timken Bearing in Canton, Ohio. This proved to be an improvement in both their social life as well as the improved remunerations from Timken. His work with Timken lasted for about 10 years and his assignments covered some accounting work but most of the career there was in data processing and systems. He very much liked the systems work and made significant contributions in the areas of plant scheduling and inventory control. His next move was to the Eaton Yale & Towne Company where he employed his special expertise in the data systems development work. After 3 years, Marianna found Cleveland to lack something for her needs and they left for Columbus, Ohio and an assignment with Nationwide Insurance headquarters. Ted's work with Nationwide lasted until his retirement 11 years later in 1991. They had settled in Westerville, a small (at that time) suburb of Columbus.

Through Marianna's encouragement, they began to purchase properties to "buy renovate—rent" and as this approach proved successful, Ted continued this strategy. During his retirement, he became interested in local civic matters and as a result found himself museum for contemporary art. Robert graduated from Ohio State U and has two children.

They had one son, Robert, who lives in Philadelphia where he is the acting director for the While living in Westerville, he has been active in numerous community activities including serving as campaign treasurer for 2 school board candidates, the first president and sponsor of the VW club of Columbus. The VW club sponsors the largest VW car show of its kind in this part of the country. Ted has also been an officer in the Westerville Art League.

Regardless of affiliation, OWU continues to encourage the pillars of Greek organizations as we focus on scholarship, leadership, service and brotherhood/sisterhood. Their continued commitment is represented by more than 6,000 hours of service and approximately \$27,000 raised for the individual chapters' national and local philanthropic partners.

As of May 2011, 530 students were initiated members of a Fraternity or Sorority on campus, representing approximately 30% of the OWU student body (239 men - 31% of males; 291 women - 30% of females). Our campus is home to the following Greeks: <u>7 Fraternities</u>— Alpha Sigma Phi, Delta Tau Delta, Phi Delta Theta, Phi Kappa Psi, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Chi, Chi Phi, (1 Colony FIJI returning in Feb. 2012)

<u>7 Sororities</u> — Alpha Kappa Alpha, Delta Delta Delta, Delta Gamma, Delta Sigma Theta, Delta Zeta, Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Kappa Gamma

OWU's Administration is very supportive of the Greek community, and this past year approved a proposal for Fraternity Expansion. The timeline for expansion was as follows:

- A recommendation to expand the fraternity system was presented to President Jones and Vice President of Student Affairs, Craig Ullom in March, 2011.
- An Expansion Committee was established to review all fraternities who formerly existed at OWU
- Research was conducted and reviewed by committee members
- A letter of invitation was sent to three fraternities who were best positioned to return; Phi Gamma Delta, Alpha Tau Omega, and Tau Kappa Epsilon
- Two fraternities accepted our invitation to present to the Expansion Committee in Sept. 2011


• From the two presentations, FIJI was selected and invited to return to campus during the spring 2012 semester for recolonization, and recruitment. **Expansion** Committee members included professional staff. current OWU Greek students representing both Panhellenic and the Council of Fraternity Presidents, and representatives from

Alumnea Panhellenic and Alumni IFC.

In addition to support from the OWU administration. our chapters continue to receive valued guidance and support from our Alumni. In February 2011, Alumnae Panhellenic hosted an event for senior sorority members to network with OWU Greek Alumnae. The women enjoyed the chance to mingle with their mentors and discuss graduate course options, and career path opportunities. As the year came to a close, a celebratory event was organized. Specifically our Greek seniors were invited to Senior Wine Tasting event with both Alumni Interfraternity Council and Alumnae Panhellenic.

This fall our alumni councils again made connections with our Greek collegians by co-hosting a leadership retreat with the OWU Student Involvement Office. Round table discussions were organized by hot topics such as recruitment, hazing prevention, alumni involvement. The students were assigned groups that mixed members from different chapters, and allowed students to see Greek leadership outside of their own chapter. The event was well received, and plans for a similar spring retreat are in the works.

Our students maintain active academic and social schedules. Between those commitments, they have found time to organize and host a variety of educational and engaging activities outside of unique chapter events. Robert (Bob) Corey '54 Bond #879

Bob Corey, who passed on February 28, 2011, came to OWU in September 1954, and pledged Theta chapter of Beta Theta Pi, following his brother Chuck who had graduated in June of that year. Bob was from NYC and was 21 when he arrived after working to get enough money to enter college. Bob, Dee Simpson and myself were put together by the chapter at Eckelberry's up the street from the old chapter house at 54 West Lincoln. Bob was easy to like and had a great sense of humor. He worked in the kitchen to help pay his board. On weekends he and I worked at the Elk's Club together in the bar to provide for spending money. 

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Did You Know This About OWU History?

Two of the most renowned names in collegiate athletics, <u>Fielding H. Yost and Lynn W. St. John</u>, had their beginnings with the OWU athletic programs. Fielding H. Yost, revered in University of Michigan sports lore as their football coach from 1901-1923 and 1925-1926 and later as Athletic Director from 1921 to 1940. But did you know that his 1st football coaching job was in 1897 at OWU? Similarly, the name Lynn W. St. John is revered by all Ohio State University fans as he coached their basketball program 1911-1919 and was manager of the baseball team 1913-1928. He served as Athletic Director 1912-1947. But did you know that he earlier coached football 1909-1911, as well as basketball and baseball from 1910-1912 at OWU?

Also, what do you know about <u>Branch Rickey at OWU</u>? After signing a professional baseball contract and thus becoming ineligible to continue his collegiate playing career, Branch Rickey '04 becomes Ohio Wesleyan's athletics director and baseball coach. During a baseball trip, Rickey's catcher, Charles Thomas, a black student from Zanesville, Ohio, is denied lodging at a hotel in South Bend, Indiana. Rickey was able to convince the hotel manager to allow Thomas to stay in his room as an unregistered guest, but the event was burned into his memory and proved to be his inspiration in signing Jackie Robinson with the Brooklyn Dodgers over 40 years later. In 1904, Rickey's baseball team wins 14 games, a school record that would stand for 81 years.

About the same time, a young man by the name of <u>George Gauthier</u> was soon to come on the OWU scene. He was the starting quarterback for Michigan State's football team in 1912 and 1913 and led the team to upset victories over Ohio State in 1912 and Michigan in 1913. Years later, Gauthier described the victory over Michigan as his first great thrill. He was head football coach in 1918, compiling a record of 4–3. The biggest victory in his single season as head football coach was a 12-9 decision over Knute Rockne's Notre Dame team. Gauthier later served as OWU football coach from 1921-1946, beating Michigan 17-7 in the first game in their new stadium....and later lost to Ohio State in 1922 in their new stadium, losing 5-0. He also served as Athletic Director for 34 years from 1921-1955.
