## Craig Was First Reserve M. D.

## To Reach Admiral Rank

Dr. Winchell McK. Craig, '15, now a surgeon at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, writes that he was the first reserve doctor in the Navy to be promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral at the end of the recent war.

Since his separation from the service in 1946, Admiral Craig has been retained in various capacities in the Navy and the Department of Defense. Since 1949, he writes, "I have been in Washington at least twice a month working in a "task force" for the Secretary of Defense . . . A group of doctors from all the services and reserve components have been reviewing the status of reserve medical officers to recommend changes relative to their duties and status.
