Melvin Lee Milligan died on January 8, at his home in Springfield, Ohio, at the age of 94, following a brief illness. Brother Milligan, a former Mayor of Springfield, had been blind for the last 14 years, but retained good health and active in-terest in his community. He was president and general manager of the Fairbanks Company until his retirement in 1928.

Bishop Lewis O. Hartman, June 30, in Newton-Wellesley Hospital (Mass.). Brother Hartman was Bishop of the Methodist Church in New England from 1944-1948.
