## MARQUIS CHILDS

Mr. Childs is a newspaperman and author of the famed syndicated column "Washington Calling" which appears in 200 newspapers across the United States. He has been writing this column for United Features since 1944.

Mr. Childs is also the author of numerous books including the best-seller, "SWEDEN: THE MIDDLE WAY," a study of the co-operative movement in Sweden, published in 1937. Since then Mr. Childs has written "WASHINGTON CALLING," "THIS IS DEMOCRACY: COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IN SCANDANAVIA," "SWEDEN, WHERE CAPITALISM IS CONTROLLED," "TOWARD A DYNAMIC AMERICA," "THIS IS YOUR WAR," and "I WRITE FROM WASHINGTON."

Mr. Childs has visited England, Sweden, Spain during the Spanish Civil War, Mexico, Brazil and Bolivia, and Yugoslavia among others. Mr. Childs was educated at the University of Wisconsin and received a Master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1925. He has received numerous awards including the Sigma Delta Chi award for 1944, "for sustained insight in national affairs, firsthand reporting and effective writing," and the Missouri Honor Award in 1951 for Distinguished Service in Journalism.

In the television field Mr. Childs rapidly is becoming an outstanding personality as a result of his frequent appearances on the popular program, "Meet the Press."

## MARGERY MAYER

Miss Mayer has recently returned to the United States following several years of service in Japan with the J-3 program of the Methodist Church.

Miss Mayer is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan where she was active in YWCA work. Following her graduation in 1945 she was Girl Reserve Secretary of the YW in Jamestown, New York. In 1947 she left for Japan and spent three years teaching at the Kwassui College in Nagasaki, Japan. During the years Miss Mayer was at Kwassui there was continual correspondence between the YWCA girls of that college and Ohio Wesleyan.
