NOTES ON THE PROGRAM

OVERTURE TO "LUCIO SILLA"

W. A. Mozart

Mozart was nearing his seventeenth birthday when he wrote his last opera for Italy, *Lucio Silla*, which was first performed in Milan at Christmas, 1772. In general the work was unsuccessful, partly because it had too many arias sung by secondary characters, and partly because of its false heroism. It was never produced outside Milan. The music, however, is beautiful, almost too beautiful, too rich and overladen. It has been said that Mozart could have written a dozen symphonies from the material in this work.

SYMPHONY NO. 1 IN G MINOR

B. Kalinnikow

One of the most popular works in present day Russia, this romantic symphony carries on the tradition of Tschaikowsky and Rimsky-Korsakov. Its chief virtues are the composer's flair for orchestration and his gift for the conventional type of romantic melody. Kalinnikow died in 1901 at the age of thirty-four. The last six years of his life had been spent in a feverish passion for composition, a race with consumption which ended his life. The sum of this activity includes two symphonies, five symphonic pieces, a cantata, and other works of smaller dimensions.

OVER THE HILLS AND FAR AWAY

Frederick Delius

Robert Sanders

Delius, the English impressionist, has been overshadowed by his more famous contemporaries of the same school, Debussy and Ravel. His style is characterized by extreme delicacy and refinement, as is illustrated in this symphonic tone poem, one of the best known works of the composer.

SATURDAY NIGHT

Robert Sanders, an American composer born in Chicago in 1906, is organist and instructor of music for the Meadville Theological School and director of music at the First Unitarian Church. For three years he was assistant conductor of the Chicago Civic Orchestra under Eric Delamarter.

Saturday Night is a fantasy on four original melodieis by the composer, so arranged that they have a "barn-dance" character.
