THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL CONVENTION OF BETA THETA PI

Theta Credit to Fraternity Reports Brother Needham.

When the Eighty-fifth General Convention of Beta Theta Pi convened at the Grand Hotel, Mackinac Island, Michigan, on the fourth of September, Brother Amrhein and Brother Anderson were on hand to represent Theta Chapter. The convention was a success from every viewpoint. Business was dispatched with rapfduty and purk C. Potth Dysfound lacking.

Two locals came before the meeting with petitions, one, Southern Methodist University, and the other University of Montana, but neither was granted. Anti-expansion steps were taken which will not allow any local to petition Beta Thea Pi. In case any new chapters are established the initiative will be taken by the General Fraternity rather than the petitioners as to the time and place of establishment.

As decided at the White Sulphur Convention the previous year, the convention of 1924 was presided over by an undergraduate and all offices and committees were cared for by undergraduates. Elmer Lindseth, Case '25, was selected for president, while Karl Fischer, Indiana '25, served as secretary. This system proved a success and all indications point to its permanency.


DEATHS

During the last few years Theta Chapter has endeavored very hard to keep up the standard of uniform excellence which has been set for it. We have tried to keep the chapter from becoming overbalanced in any direction: to keep it perfectly balanced by a mixture of types and of activities. While we have maintained this balance, we have an athletic record which is duplicated but seldom. The chapter has representatives in practically every branch of sport, and as our men have developed into the leaders of their respective branches we have the unusual distinction of having three captains in the house this year. Bro. Harold F. Amrhein, '25, of Bay City, Mich., captained the football team during the past season; Bro. Alford H. Scott, '26, of Des Moines, Iowa, is captain of the now functioning swimming team, and Bro. Joseph D. Morrissey, '25 of London, Ohio, is captain of the baseball outfit for the spring.

Bro. Amrhein's success has not been a great surprise, as he has an excellent high school record, having played both football and basketball, gaining All-State mention in the former. He started out by playing whom sport writers delight to call







During his three years as a varsity candidate, his success has been uniform: a regular guard his sophomore year, a practically unanimous allconference choice his junior year, and captain of a very successful team his senior year. It was only that last unfortunate game this year with Ohio University that broke his remarkable list of three years' successice conference victories. But "Ammie's" prowess is not confined to the gridiron, as he is president of the chapter this year, is working his way through school, and is in many other campus activities.

When Bro. Scott first strayed from the confines of the great corn state his athletic prowess was a matter of some conjecture. I ast year, howevery, he became the protege of Bro. 
